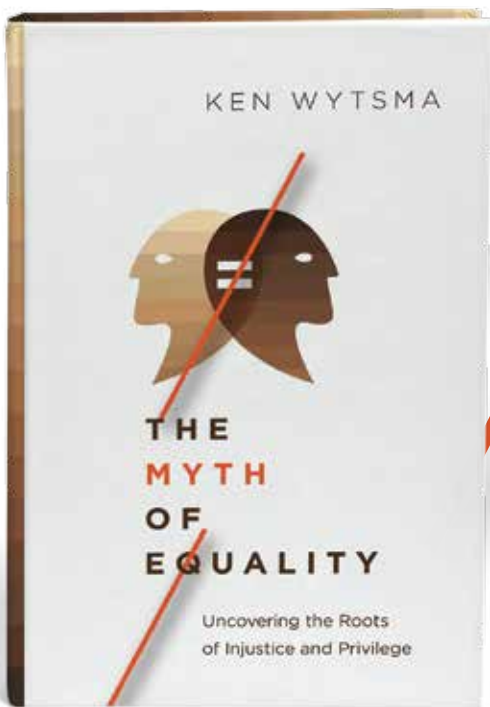
TALKING POINTS
