**Daniel I. Block** (DPhil, Liverpool University) is Gunther H. Knoedler Professor Emeritus of Old Testament at Wheaton College. He has authored *The Book of Ezekiel* (2 vols.; Eerdmans, 1997, 1998); *Ezekiel: When God Abandons His People* (Crossway, forthcoming 2024); Covenant: *The Foundation of God's Grand Plan of Redemption* (Baker, 2021); and *For the Glory of God: Recovering a Biblical Theology of Worship* (Baker, 2014), among others.

**lain Duguid** is Professor of Old Testament at Westminster Theological Seminary, Philadelphia. His PhD thesis from Cambridge was published by E. J. Brill as *Ezekiel and the Leaders of Israel*, and he is the author of two commentaries on Ezekiel (NIV Application and ESV Expository Commentary), as well as commentaries on numerous other biblical books.

Mark S. Gignilliat (PhD, University of St Andrews) is Professor of Divinity at Beeson Divinity School, Samford University. He is the author of A Brief History of Old Testament Criticism (Zondervan, 2012); Reading Scripture Canonically: Theological Instincts for Old Testament Interpretation (Baker Academic, 2019); and Micah (International Theological Commentary, T&T Clark, 2020).

**Dana M. Harris** (PhD, Trinity Evangelical Divinity School) is Professor of New Testament and department chair at Trinity Evangelical Divinity School. She is the author of *Hebrews* (Exegetical Guide to the Greek New Testament, B&H, 2019) and *An Introduction to Biblical Greek Grammar: Elementary Syntax and Linguistics* (Zondervan, 2020).


